



A-Start with two bar jumps placed close enough together so that the dog cannot get between them. With the dog on right, send over jump #1 and wait for dog to arc back to come over jump #2. Most dogs will do this naturally. You do not want to move nor call the dog back over jump #2. As soon as the dog moves its head toward jump #2, you would click (or otherwise verbally acknowledge). Reward as dog comes over #2.

B-As the dog becomes proficient at going over #1 and finding the back side of jump #2, you will then start to SLOWLY separate the jumps until they are 4 to 6 feet apart.

C-When the dog is proficient at this stage, you will then start slowly angling one jump (eventually moving the second jump from a 180 degree angle to a 270 degree angle).

D-Once at an angle of at least 270, you can then start to move the angled jump forward to make the angle more difficult.

The goal is NOT to go into the box created by the two jumps. You want the dog to work independently and to make the curve to the outside of the second jump with only a hand and/or verbal cue.
